O race stupefied by the dread of cold death, why do you fear Styx, why the shades and empty words, ... souls are free from death, and, when they have left their earlier abode, they always live in new homes and dwell where they have been received.

All things change, nothing dies. The spirit wanders and comes from there to here, from here to there and occupies whatever body it likes, and from wild beasts transfers into human bodies, and into wild beasts when in ours, and does not perish at any time.

And since I am borne on a great sea, and have given full sail to the winds, there is nothing in the whole world which persists; all things flow, and every image formed is transient. Time too itself glides by in constant motion not unlike a river.

... as wave is driven on by wave, and one before, pushed on by one coming behind, is pushing one before itself on, thus does time fly just so, and just so does it follow and it is always new. For what was before has been left, and becomes what it had not been, and all moments are renewed.

Our own bodies too always and without any rest are changing, and neither what we were or are shall we be tomorrow.

Time, the devourer of things, and you, jealous old age, you destroy all things and, after blighting them with the teeth of age, little by little you consume all things in slow death.
