Squirrel Food Collecting Guide

What do squirrels eat?

Squirrels eat lots of different types of food but their favourite food is seeds. Seeds of some trees grow inside nuts or cones.

Oak, hazel and beech trees are all British trees that grow nuts. These trees lose their leaves in winter and are called deciduous trees.

Trees that grow cones are called conifers. Types of conifer trees in Britain are Scots pine, Norway spruce and Sitka spruce.

Conifers are more common in Scotland and Northern England and deciduous trees are more common South England and Wales.




Below are the different types of nuts and cones that squirrels eat

Beechnuts

- Beech trees are very common in Britain. They are most common in east England and south-east Wales.
- The nut of the beech tree is called a beechnut.
- Beechnuts are small, shiny and dark brown. They are almost triangle shaped.
- The nuts grow inside hairy cups. You might find these opened 'cups' on the ground under beech trees.

Hazelnuts

- Hazel trees are usually found in woodland with other trees such as oak trees, ash trees and birch trees.
- You might have eaten hazelnuts! The bit we eat is the seed, inside the shiny brown shell.
- Hazelnuts grow on the tree in groups of 4 or 5.
- The nuts are shiny and dark brown. They are round with a small point on one end and are flatter on the other end. They are about 2cm in size.

- Acorns grow on oak trees.
- Oak trees are very common in south and central Britain.
- Acorns are held onto the tree by a little hat called a cupule.
- You might find acorns with or without this cupule as it falls off when the acorns are ripe and ready to fall from the tree.

Scots pine cones

- Scots pine are one of only a few British conifer trees. The others have been brought to Britain from other places by humans to grow for wood.
- Scots pine are very common in the Scottish Highlands. Red squirrels really like to eat the seeds inside the cones of these trees.

Norway spruce cones

- Norway spruce trees were brought to Britain to grow in timber plantations.
- They are often used as Christmas trees!
- The cones of Norway spruce trees are longer than other pine cones.

Sitka spruce cones


- Sitka spruce trees were brought to Britain from North America in Victorian times.
- Wood from Sitka spruce trees is useful for making paper, boats and ships.
- You can tell cones of Sitka spruce from other cones as they have crinkled edges.

Please collect these **squirrel foods**:

Beechnuts	Small, shiny, triangular. Grow inside a hairy cup.	
Hazelnuts	Round, shiny, dark brown. Flatter on one end.	
Acorns	Brown, oval shaped. Have a 'hat' called a cupule.	
Scots pine cone	Small and harder than other cones.	
Norway spruce cone	Long, spiky.	
Sitka spruce cone	Have crinkled edges.	

Please **DO NOT** collect these:

Squirrels do not eat these.

Horse chestnuts	Much bigger than hazelnuts. Found in a spiky green case.	
Sycamore Seeds	Small seeds with papery 'wings'.


